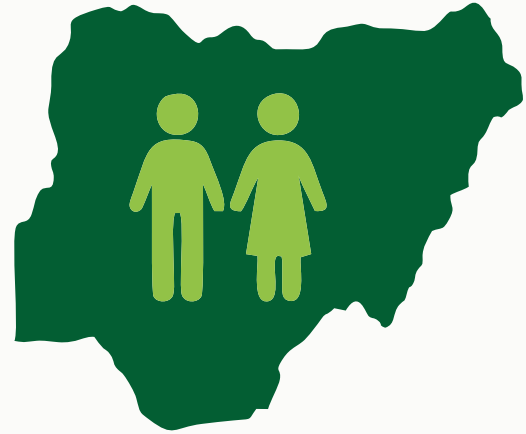

Why Zamfara Developed the Digital Literacy Framework

At ZITDA, we asked a fundamental question:

How do we ensure that every citizen—regardless of age, profession or location—has the opportunity to participate in the digital economy?

Our answer was the **Zamfara Digital Literacy Framework (ZDLF)**.

Rather than implementing isolated training programmes, we developed a comprehensive statewide framework that integrates digital skills into education, government and economic development.



The objective is simple:

Build digital competence across the entire population.

The Four Pillars of the ZDLF

The Framework focuses on four strategic pillars:



PILLAR ONE

Digital literacy for students across all educational levels.



PILLAR TWO

Digital capacity building for civil servants and public institutions.



PILLAR THREE

Digital upskilling for entrepreneurs, MSMEs, artisans and the private sector.



PILLAR FOUR

Partnerships, sustainability, monitoring and continuous improvement.

Together, these pillars create a pipeline of digital talent from the classroom to the workplace.

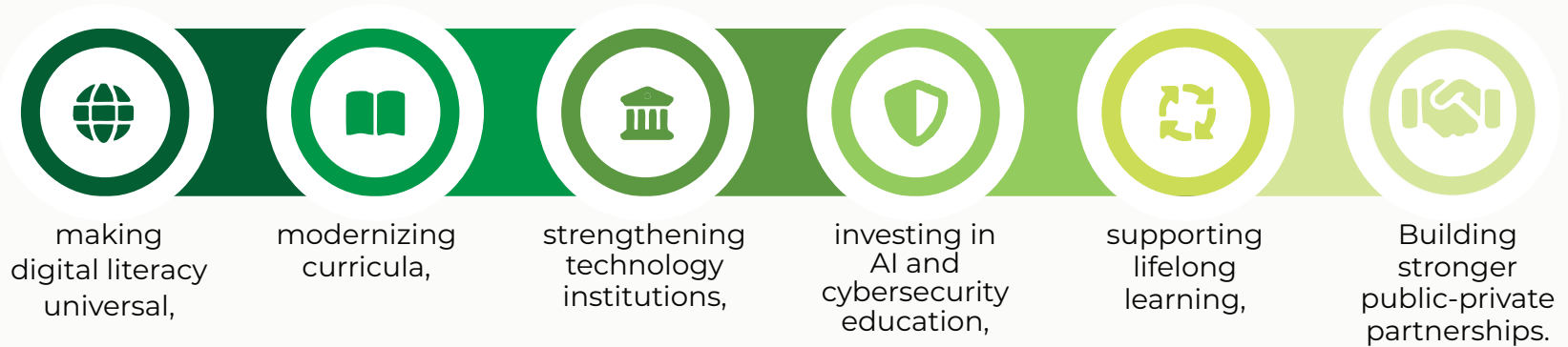
